To coincide with **Black History Month**, the History and Classics departments hosted a seminar celebrating Black achievement throughout history.



Clearly influenced by the theme of BHM 2023,

'Saluting Our Sisters', there were staff and student presentations on a variety of themes such as the activism of **Tarana Burke**, the literature of Black British author **Andrea Levy**, **Dr Kimberle Crenshaw** and her work on Intersectionality; as well as some more personal accounts including the transformational impact that our recent tour to South Africa had on students. Students have also been learning about **Mansa Musa** and the Empire of Mali, Nigerian views on the effects of British colonialism, the story of Walter Tull (see above), as well as studying the post-Civil War experience of African Americans in depth as part of the A-Level History course.
